








Methodology

- Benenson Strategy Group conducted 801 online interviews nationwide from February 10 – 15, 2022 among women who are likely 2022 voters.
- The margin of error for the dataset overall is +/- 3.5% at the 95% confidence level and is higher among subgroups.
- Due to rounding, some percentages may not add up to 100%.



Few trust our institutions – including more than half of Republican women who lack trust in the information coming from the CDC





% Pessimistic about the economy

















Women are feeling the effects of the economy in their own pockets, especially among women with lower incomes

Compared to 2021, more women have moved down the ladder in terms of financial comfort










Nearly all women believe we need better healthcare and support systems – even one that expands Medicaid, Medicare, and the ACA





Women of color are particularly motivated by the goal and symbolism of electing more women









The Supreme Court









COVID-19's Impacts on Mental Health

Would you say that the situation with Covid-19 has affected your mental health...?







Nearly half say they're feeling more burned out, and a plurality are lonelier too – particularly younger women










More women are starting to think life will never go back to "normal"







More than two-thirds of moms worry abut their kids contracting COVID-19, yet half say their quality of life increases when they're in school

When my kids are in school in-person, my quality of life improves significantly...










Parents are still happy to have had more time with their kids and want to keep familycentric habits...




Pandemic Impacts on Women in the Workforce



More than 3 in 4 believe there will be long lasting impacts on women and their careers and the old 9-5 model won't work anymore










Women who've had the flexibility to work from home want to keep that flexibility – though moms, particularly of young kids, could use a break from being at home
