## GENDER ON THE BALLOT <br> She Votes: Women's Voices at the Forefront

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## Methodology

- Benenson Strategy Group conducted 811 online interviews nationwide from February 3-8, 2023 among women who are registered voters, including an oversample of younger women 18-25 years old.
- The margin of error for the dataset overall is $+/-3.4 \%$ at the $95 \%$ confidence level and is higher among subgroups.
- Due to rounding, some percentages may not add up to $100 \%$.


## 5 Key Takeaways

There is a greater sense of dread and worry among women this year, stemming from worsening personal financial situations and inflation. Women have cut back on entertainment and smaller luxuries significantly, and almost half have cut back on necessities like groceries. With these financial challenges, financial goals of security and saving or affording retirement seem out of reach for many.

Women are feeling even more burned out than ever this year - particularly Black women and moms of young children. Younger women are feeling burned out and struggling financially more than other groups, with 1 in 3 not making ends meet month to month.

Looking ahead to 2024, women are feeling more engaged in politics and about 1 in 3 talk to their friends and family about politics weekly. Women want to get involved in local, state or federal level politics, though just 1 in 3 have actually been able to become involved. Young women are looking to elect more women leaders, with over half saying it's important for the 2024 candidate to be a woman and most believe women can push through gridlock to get things done in Congress.

4 In light of the Dobbs decision last summer, women are highly concerned about reproductive rights, and tuned into the conversation around making abortion and other healthcare services more accessible and affordable to anyone in need.

With increasing partisanship around every corner, a plurality of women are concerned about extremism on both sides of the ideological spectrum. There is also deep skepticism among Republican women in particular of our regulatory institutions and our election system, with nearly half of Republican women (and 1 in 4 overall) saying they don't trust the results of national elections.

## Reproductive Rights

When it comes to reproductive rights, the vast majority believe abortion should be available and/or the government should be kept out of decisions
